

## **Repeating Decimals**

## EXAMPLE Writing a Repeating Decimal as a Fraction

In a recent survey,  $0.\overline{45}$  of those asked chose blue as their favorite color. Write  $0.\overline{45}$  as a fraction in simplest form.

Step 1 Represent the given decimal with a variable.

$$n = 0.\overline{45}$$

**Step 2** Multiply by  $10^n$ , where n = the number of digits that repeat. In this case, multiply by 10<sup>2</sup>, or 100, because the repeating part of the decimal is 45.

$$100n = 45.\overline{45}$$

Step 3 Subtract to eliminate the repeating part.

$$\begin{array}{lll} 100n = & 45.454545 \dots \\ \underline{-n=-0.454545\dots} & \leftarrow \text{Use the Subtraction Property of Equality.} \\ 99n = & 45.000000\dots & \leftarrow \text{Simplify.} \\ 99n = & 45 \end{array}$$

Step 4 Solve the new equation.

$$\frac{99n}{99} = \frac{45}{99} \qquad \leftarrow \text{Divide each side by 99.}$$

$$n = \frac{45}{99} = \frac{5}{11} \qquad \leftarrow \text{Simplify using the GCF, 9.}$$

• The repeating decimal  $0.\overline{45}$  equals  $\frac{5}{11}$ .
